



Fostering a child takes more than love—it takes a village. For Kobey and his husband, that village includes family, social workers, his Northern Rivers support team, and fellow foster parents, and that village has felt like home for a long time.

Kobey's journey as foster parent began five years ago, but the calling to care for children in need has been with him since before he was born. Both he and his mother were adopted, and now he and his husband are on the path to



adopting their foster daughter, who has been with them since she was just two days old.

The happy occasion brings Kobey back to that night five years ago when they welcomed the first foster children into their home, a five-year-old girl and her 18-month-old brother. "We didn't have anything we needed for older kids," Kobey remembers. "But when the call came, there was no hesitation."

Going from two to four overnight was a huge adjustment. Kobey credits resources like Northern Rivers' Foster Parent Connection groups for helping him through. "I'd call my on-call foster parent at 2 a.m. just to ask if what I was going through was normal," he says.

This year's theme? Mission Possible: *Spread Love!*




Love in Bloom at the Greenhouse
